

SUPPLEMENTAL NUTRITION ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (SNAP)

As food costs rise, the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) is a key part of helping families, seniors, kids, and community members keep food on the table. SNAP (formerly known as food stamps) is the nation's most important and effective anti-hunger program. SNAP benefits are federally funded, with states and the federal government splitting the administrative costs. In 2022, SNAP helped nearly 90,000 Montana residents have enough food to eat.



SNAP directly supports local grocery stores, farmers' markets, and Montana economies. SNAP is an economic stimulus, with each \$1 in SNAP generating an estimated \$1.50 in economic activity in a slow economy.

Households receive monthly SNAP benefits on electronic benefit transfer (EBT) cards, which can only be used to purchase food at 800 grocery stores and farmers' markets around Montana.
